Message from the Mayor

On September 11, 2001, our world changed. The horrendous images of the destruction wrought on thousands of innocent people, some of them our friends and neighbors, will stay with us forever. There are no words to express the depth of our grief for those who were lost and their families... or of our tremendous pride in the many heroes who died while making a difference, including many in our own community... or of our gratitude to those who have worked long and tirelessly in the recovery effort. I am heartened by the groundswell of patriotism and unity that has resulted from this ungodly act, and by the recognition of our common enemies - hatred, religious intolerance, fear and anger. I am confident that our great nation, along with others, will rise to this occasion, and that the world will be a better place when the dust settles, and this war on terrorism is won.

As New York City begins the process of rebuilding, the Borough will begin the process of our downtown revitalization, and I plan to include a monument in our downtown area as a memorial to those we have lost, and as a tribute to the heroism and strength of spirit that our nation's citizens have demonstrated.

I hope each of you will participate in our democracy on **November 6** by voting in the general election. If you have not yet registered to vote, you can pick up a voter registration form at the Borough Clerk's office. The deadline to register is October 9, and we will be open until 9:00 p.m. that evening to accommodate last-minute registrations.

This year, I am joining more than 100 other Mayors and elected officials across New Jersey in support of **Take Your Kids to Vote/New Jersey**. I will be designating Election Day, Tuesday, November 6, 2001, as **Take Your Kids to Vote Day** in the Borough. As children, many of us remember going to the voting booth with our parents. By doing so, we learned how to vote at an early age, and it is important for us now to continue that tradition. I hope you will make voting a family affair this year by bringing your children to the polls on November 6.

I have recently appointed a **Historic Advisory Committee** whose first task will be to work towards the designation of a portion of Stockton Street as a National Historic District. Playing with Fire

Fire Official Tim Murray offers these tips for a safe (and cozy) autumn.

- Although chiminaras (outdoor fireplaces) are not covered under the Fire Code for private homes, it's a good idea to keep them at least 15 feet from your home to avoid accidental fires or melted vinyl siding.
- You should have your heating system serviced and your chimney cleaned to ensure that the products of combustion are venting properly to the exterior. Make sure you have installed a carbon monoxide detector in your home.
- Make sure that any portable heating units you use are UL-approved and that safeguards are built in, such as tip-over protection. Do not use extension cords with portable heaters, as they may overheat and cause a fire.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement. Many fatal fires begin late at night or in the early morning. For extra safety, install smoke alarms both inside and outside the sleeping area. Also, smoke alarms should be installed on the ceiling or 6 to 8 inches below the ceiling on side walls. Since smoke and many deadly gases rise, installing your smoke alarms at the proper level will provide you with the earliest warning possible. Always follow the manufacturer's installation instructions.

The Borough of Hightstown will be conducting its semi-annual water hydrant flushing between October 15 and October 26. Flushing will take place between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. You may experience some discoloration during this time. Do not be alarmed—your water is safe to drink, and it should clear up shortly.

"Get the Flu Shot and the Pneu Shot"

The flu is a serious illness that causes symptoms which include fever, aches and pains, sore throat, runny nose and chills.

When people 65 or older and those with chronic health problems get the flu, they are more likely to develop serious complications which may cause them to be hospitalized.

Getting the flu shot before the flu season is the best way to protect yourself. A new flu vaccine is made each year because the flu virus tends to change each flu season. For this reason, it is important to get the flu shot every year.

To protect yourself from pneumococcal disease, adults who are 65 or older should get the pneumococcal shot. Most people need to get the shot only once.

You can get the shot at the Annual Flu and Pneumonia Clinic at East Windsor Municipal Building on Wednesday, October 31, 2001 between 9:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. by appointment only. The annual flu shot is free for residents of Hightstown who are over 60 years old. Call the East Windsor Health Department at 443-4000 to schedule an appointment.



Beware of Radon!



Question - What's a five letter word for something that is in your home, is invisible and can cause lung cancer?

Answer - RADON. Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that is found in all homes, but in some homes reaches high levels that can be a health hazard. If you haven't already tested for radon, protect your family by testing now. Test kits can be purchased in many hardware stores and health departments, or call the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection Radon Program at 1-800-648-0394 for a list of certified companies who provide testing services and kits.

The Family Mentor Program

The Family Mentor Program of Mercer County is one of the many programs provided by Family and Children's Services of Central New Jersey. The program matches a family in need of support with a volunteer (mentor) from the community. Families are voluntary participants and are provided the service at no cost to them. The program's mentors, after an interviewing and training process, commit one to three hours a week to their families in order to form a relationship with them and address their specific needs. For instance, some families need assistance with parenting, budgeting, nutrition and accessing community resources, while others are looking for emotional support and a patient, nonjudgmental ear. Participation in this program is an extremely positive and fulfilling experience for both families and mentors, and is an important asset to the community.

Currently, the Family Mentor Program has a severe shortage of mentors, and is actively recruiting volunteers. If you have the time and ability to help, please consider joining the program as a volunteer mentor. A mentor must be at least 21 years of age, with a valid driver's license and access to a vehicle.

Halloween Safety Tips

- Use make-up or face paint instead of masks. If you decide to use a mask, make certain that the mask fits properly and has holes large enough for mouth and eyes.
- Choose flame-retardant costumes.
- Wear light-colored clothing and/ or costumes at night, making certain that they are short enough to prevent tripping. Add reflective tape or reflectors to dark costumes if you will be out after dark. Make every attempt to trickor-treat before sundown, and bring a flashlight in case of delay.
- Make props out of cardboard rather than metal or wood.
- Give and receive wrapped or packaged candy only. Have children bring their treats home for parental inspection before they are consumed.
- Accompany small children and elementary school age children when they are trick-or-treating, and send older children in groups.
- Have children stay within their neighborhood, and only visit homes of people you know.
